From the Dean

Dear Cathedral Family,

Every year on Ash Wednesday, a portion from Second Corinthians is read: *We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God* (2 Cor 5:20b). Paul writes to the Christian community in Corinth – a community with internal conflicts as made known in both First and Second Corinthians – urging them to be at harmony with one another. The passage read on Ash Wednesday is in the midst of this longer paragraph:

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. (2 Cor 5:16-21)

The Westminster Dictionary of Christian Ethics (1986 ed.) defines reconciliation as this, “a

change of attitude from hostility to amity, of God towards humanity, of humanity towards God, and of individuals towards each other... It is central to Jesus’ teaching about divine forgiveness that our reconciliation with God must depend upon our openness to reconciliation with those who have offended us or whom we have offended (see Matthew 5:23 and following).” Lent, this period of forty days (plus Sundays) where we can imagine ourselves sojourning with Jesus in the wilderness, is a time when we are invited by the Church to examine our relationship with God, with our fellow human beings, and with all of creation. There are many ways to engage in this self-examination: prayer; changes in daily habits by taking something on or giving something up; taking (additional) time to read the Bible, to read or listen to devotional materials, to join others in One Cathedral, One Book in reading *Freeing Jesus* by Diana Butler Bass; engaging in ways of service to others in need. For prayer, I encourage you to join in the simple form of the Examen (a prayer form out of the Jesuit tradition) along with others in the Diocese of Spokane – pause a few minutes in the morning and in the evening to take time in conversation with God. You can also join in walking the Stations of the Cross on Wednesdays March 1 and March 22 at 5:30 pm.

In Lent, across these forty days (plus Sundays), we have an opportunity to intentionally put on our “God-glasses” and to try

to see creation and our fellow humans with God’s eyes of love. I know that I listen to others differently when I see that other person, especially if their opinions and beliefs are different from mine, as a beloved child of God. Our ability to engage in reconciliation and seek harmony – rather than begrudgingly going separate ways – depends on our willingness to see one another with eyes of love and charity towards our neighbors. With open hearts, minds, and hands, let us make our Lenten journey, seeking reconciliation in our world and greater relationship with God.

From the Associate Priest

Lent feels like a good time to reflect on forgiveness. We Christians are part of a forgiven people who regularly pray to be forgiven in the measure we forgive. "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." What a challenging prayer! Were it not for Jesus explicit teaching that I pray this way I cannot ever imagine asking God to forgive me *as I have forgiven others*. Imagine God giving me back all the passive aggression I have doled out in my life - for all eternity God just gives me the silent treatment while denying being mad and telling me I'm too sensitive. Were it not for the rock bed of assurance God has forgiven us, I might not have the courage to pray the way Jesus teaches.

Some of us have more to forgive than others, but we are all together in it. When we say "forgive *us* as *we* forgive," those of us who have less to forgive name our solidarity in forgiveness with those who have more. Sometimes you may rest in the faith of the church, which is practicing forgiveness on your behalf. Sometimes you may know the companionship of the church in forgiving hard things. Always we know the word of the cross is the word of forgiveness.

To forgive is not to excuse. People really do terrible things. Miroslav Volf taught me that forgiveness always carries an implicit accusation. To say we forgive is to say we accuse. Forgiveness is also not a transaction. It is a healing process. Sometimes we let others go into the mercy of God and other times into the judgment of God, knowing they are one and the

same love. We forgive to participate in God's healing of our lives and communities knowing healing is sometimes slow. Even the smallest movement towards forgiveness is good movement. Forgiveness is also not giving up on accountability. We are called to be people of justice as well as people of forgiveness. We can only discern the difference and the overlap in community. Alone we may often call our anger justice and our estrangement forgiveness.

Being in a community of forgiveness means we will sooner or later find reason to need to forgive one another in the church. Our calling to be a community of reconciliation is worth the risk. We shouldn't shame ourselves or others around unforgiveness and/or ask people to re-traumatize themselves in spaces of injury. God has the time for us to take our time where there is hurt. Still, we may reflect on our life in Christian community and discover we have never or rarely needed to forgive anyone. We might ask ourselves, if so, if we are really in a Christian community at all or in something much less inspiring.

There are many local events and happenings of interest that speak to the Care of Water, our Hope for Creation theme. Riverkeepers has a slate of upcoming events, including an international fly fishing film festival at the Garland Theater March 2, and a two-part panel discussion on the Rights of the River (Moot Court March 21 and discussion group May 2). Between these two events Riverkeeper's Jerry White will be presenting on the Rights of the River at Hope for Creation. Riverkeepers also will hold their annual river clean up on the morning of Earth Day (you could do that and still make the street fair in the afternoon at the Cathedral.)

Spokane River forum, hosts its [Join Us at the 2023 Spokane River Forum Conference – Spokane River Forum](#), Apr 26-27 at the Spokane Convention Center. An annual event before Covid, the forum is back.

Other events upcoming in line with the environmental aspects of EXPO's anniversary include a Public Lands Story telling event, *Encounters on Public Lands*, Thursday, February 23rd at 6:00 pm in the Wonder Building 835 N Post. Gonzaga's Center for Climate, Society and the Environment always has a strong line up of [Events | Gonzaga University](#). I have tickets (free!) to listen to Cardinal Michael Czerny, S.J. (Gonzaga class of '68), Prefect of the Vatican Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Devel-

opment, speak on the intersection of faith and climate change. Thursday, March 9 at 7 pm, at the Myrtle Woldson Performing Arts Center.

There is a major natural gas pipeline in our backyard (runs through Liberty Lake) which may soon carry twice the volume of natural gas as today. The company that operates the Keystone oil pipeline, GTN, has asked the Federal Energy Resource Commission for approval which may come as soon as March. The pipeline is old. What possibly could go wrong? Faith and Values [People's Hearing on Proposed Expansion of Spokane Valley/ Liberty Lake Area Pipeline to be Held Virtually Feb. 13 - SpokaneFāVS \(spokanefav.com\)](#) on this last month.

Earth Ministries' [WA State Legislation – Earth Ministry](#) before the state legislature have progressed out of policy committees and are headed to budget. More info on bills related to climate and growth management (HB 1181 / SB 5203); environmental Justice (HB 1723 / SB 5651); packaging WRAP Act (HB 1131 / SB 5154); and toxic free cosmetics (HB 1047) [Bill Info Detailed Legislative Reports \(wa.gov\)](#) There are still opportunities to write to your elected representatives; see the [Washington State Legislature 2023 Session Cutoff Calendar](#).

The City has begun preparations or EXPO+50. Garrett Jones, head of the Parks Department is on point; a 2-month long celebration is envisioned starting on May 4th (EXPO's opening day) and running through July 7th. Activities will be in Arts & Culture, Environmental Stewardship, Recreation & Sports, Tribal Culture, and EXPO's Legacy to Spokane. Some 150 'activation events' will be held in Riverfront Park and surrounding areas. Probably the Cathedral will host one or more. Expect to see the announcement of the Coordinator for EXPO+50 within weeks.

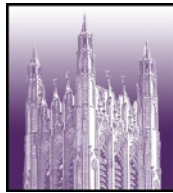
