From the Dean By the Very Rev. Heather VanDeventer

Dear Cathedral Family,

St. John's is Rooted in Love. If there is one thing about the Cathedral that I can say with certainty in these still uncertain and unsteady times, it is that you are Rooted in Love. Here is why I say this.

In these past 18 months of disruption and change to how we live our day to day lives, you have been Rooted in Love by picking up the phone to call someone in the congregation to check on them. You have bought school supplies and donated money for our neighbors at Grant Elementary, helping those families to make ends meet, buy groceries, and have the tools that their children need to be successful students. You have figured out new technology so that you can be at worship, at committee meetings, at faith formation, and at fellowship with one another. Some of you even took a leap of faith and sang online, letting yourself be digitally stitched together into a choir bringing music to life. You came into the Cathedral in the middle of the week to pray. You brought your lawn chair or blanket to be with the worshipping community under the cathedral of pine trees. And in the past six months - as we were able to safety regather for worship, study, fellowship, hospitality, committee and volunteer work, and music - you showed up, wore a mask, talked louder, tried harder to enunciate, and, yes, broke rules about avoiding handshakes and hugs because you were so happy to see one another. You did this Sunday in and Sunday out and across the days of the week in between. You are Rooted in Love.

For some, that love is spoken of as a love for friends and community. For others, it is the love for our beautiful and soaring Cathedral building, architecture, and stained-glass win-

dows. For still others, it is love as manifested in the opportunity to serve and to help others serve those in need. It is love in making music together and for many it is love in hearing and being uplifted by the beautiful music made by our choirs and musicians. It is the love of learning and exploring our faith together. It is love of the laughter and discovery of children, the energy and zest of our youth. It is the love of the quiet preparation of patens, chalice, oh so many cruets, linens, and paraments to adorn and support our worship together. It is the love of cooking a feast - by which I mean most coffee hour spreads - as well as feasts to feed our neighbors' stomachs and hearts. It is the love of time dedicated to prayer. It is even love of a meeting in goodly and godly order where the business of the Cathedral gets done.

All of these ways that you, that we, are Rooted in Love are rooted in our shared foundation of faith in Jesus Christ and love of God. It is God's love in which our roots are watered, grown, nourished, and given opportunity to thrive and to share God's love with the world. Psalm 1, verse 3, tells us this about



God's people:

They are like trees planted by streams of water, bearing fruit in due season, with leaves that do not wither; everything they do shall prosper.

Soon you will receive a pledge card in the mail along with information about our sources of income, our areas of expenditure, and our budget goals for 2022. Making a pledge of financial support to the Cathedral is sign of your commitment to participating in St. John's congregation, ministry, and community outreach. We also know that not everyone can do that and so we remind you that a pledge and financial commitment of any size is important and does not go to waste in our budget and operations. Let us be the people of God, growing tall and with deep roots like trees watered by God's love and grace.


switching of rooms mid-way through rehearsal as needed run ning air-purifiers during rehears als physical distancing

The season for our community garden is drawing to a close with an abundant harvest of tomatoes, squash, corn, cucumbers, potatoes, onions and just about anything you can plant in a small garden plot. The hot summer, although challenging, was a good climate for growing our gardens. This was the first year that our gardeners grew sunflowers, some of which looked like a small forest that will feed many birds.



This was also our first year with an expanded space of 34 gardens (up from 18 in 2020). Our gardeners include members of the Cathedral congregation, residents of Canterbury Court and folks from the wider community. From the Associate

"The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims his handiwork. Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge." – Psalm 19

I first encountered these lines from the book of Psalms as a child and adolescent in communal prayer and church preaching. Later, the whole of Psalm 19 was used to illustrate God's self-revelation through two channels, general revelation (in the natural world) and special revelation (in Holy Scripture). While studying Biblical Hebrew I was introduced to the place of the same psalm in Jewish prayer and worship. Still later, when I became an Episcopalian, I was invited to pray these lines regularly in the cycle of the Daily Office (a schedule of daily prayer for morning, noon, evening, and before bed) and during Holy Eucharist. When I was in seminary, I was introduced to the tradition of Anglican Chant and taught how to sing these lines

(along with the rest of the Psalter) at the pace of speaking.

I last encountered these lines, "the heavens are telling the glory of God...," on September 12 when we chanted the morning's psalm over the harmony of the Cathedral Choir for the first time since March 2020. The beauty of their voices giving voice to these lines from the psalter, which themselves tell of the voice of creation, was quietly stirring. One of my favorite things about the tradition of Anglican Chant is the way it holds so much emotion in such a restrained way. There is a tension there that can break your heart. It broke mine on that Sunday and reminded me of the cumulative effect of praying the psalms together in community.

This summer I used the liturgy of the Eucharist to explore arts and creativity with children at Camp Cross. I asked Bishop Gretchen if there was anything she would like me to share with our campers. She shared that one way to think of our worship is as a rather complicated piece of music. "When you first learn it, it is a little boring. It takes practice. The only way to get there is to think about the hard parts as a kind of discipline." Eventually, you will have more and more of the memory of the church, your personal experiences and your life with God, more and more of the scriptural world which our liturgy constantly invokes, and more and more knowledge of your place in the story of God.

This is especially the case with the psalms (the prayerbook at heart of our scripture and worship). "The heavens are telling the glory of God. The firmament proclaims his handiwork." It's true, all creation is giving voice to God, including the creation that gathers to chant these words from the psalms together online and in-person.

Notes from Outreach

A big thank you to everyone who contributed to the school supply drive. We were able to give a large donation to Grant Elementary and the principal, staff and teachers were very appreciative. The supplies will be used by all students and will be of benefit to many whose families have a difficult time providing all the items the student are required to have. Service League has also purchased water bottles for every student at the school. These are necessary as the water fountains cannot be used due to COVID. We will continue to find ways to support the school and students during the year.

St. John's has partnered with Spokane Meals on Wheels for many years suppling drivers to deliver the meals to seniors who need assistance in order to have a hot, nutritious meal every day. In the past the meals served were prepared in Seattle, frozen and sent to Spokane. The facility here heated the meals and delivered them to the recipients. Over the past year Meals on Wheels has been able to completely remodel and enlarge their kitchen facility and will now be able to prepare in house all the meals delivered, which means they will be fresh. In order to make this work they are in need of volunteers to help with food prep and packaging. Anyone who is interested in this work can contact the Meals on Wheels Office.

Another area where Meals on Wheels supplies support to seniors is in their For Paws Sake program. Recognizing how important pets are to many seniors who are home bound, they provide dog and cat food to those who need it and they also can provide pet grooming. They welcome pet food donations or monetary donations earmarked for pet food.

Meals on Wheels works as an important resource for many seniors in our community. Not only by providing meals and care for pets but also as a means to check in with home bound seniors to make sure they are okay. Any time a senior does not open the door or respond to a call

Diocesan Creation Care *By John Wallingford*

Lecture Nov 10 ; Gonzaga's Center for Climate, Society and the Environment

Last November Pat Munts, on behalf of the diocese, established a Creation Care Committee. Since then we have met monthly on the third Monday of the month to discuss a common focus (Columbia watershed), explore candidate projects and offerings (pilgrimages to precious sites in that watershed), and plan outreach. We will be joining Rick Matters and theBeloved Community in reading and facilitated discussion of Shalom and the Community of Creation: An Indiginous Vision by Randy S. Woodley. Ellen Davis is Professor of Bible and Practical Theology at Duke and an Episcopalian. Her book Scripture, Culture and Agriculture describes four aspects of care for the Land: lists four principles: 1) the land comes first. If the land is well tended, society will flourish; 2) informed ignorance is good, ie we are billions of times more ignorant than we are knowledgeable, so we should pay attention to what the earth is telling us, 3) human existence requires materialism, in moderation, so we have to acknowledge the use of natural resources, but wisely and 4) there is value-- beyond current price-- in cov-

enant with the land. The last phrase of the 5th commandment is often overlooked, "Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long upon the land that the Lord thy God giveth thee." The Hope for Creation Conference will pay special attention to the Land. In preparation, there will be a presentation on November 10th at 5pm by Dr Daniel Stulac, a student of Dr Davis and now assistant Professor at Duke, showing how the Book of Kings teaches that the health of the land and the health of society are tightly linked. Dr Stulac will be joined from New York by Yoshi Silverstein, who also is expert in this subject. Yoshi is the son of Temple Beth Shalom's Pam Silverstein, one of our tree planting partners. Brian is checking with the Board about being a formal cosponsor of the Conference (we think the Board will agree to cosponsorship). We have learned that there is an Earth Day march planned for noon Saturday April 23. Rather than conflicting with that march, we are adapting our program to allow our participants to join that march and return to the complete the program. This new relationship gives us fresh contacts

throughout the Spokane environmental community, gains the attention of the huge Gonzagaoriented community, and in a slightly poetic way, positions the Cathedral in our historic middle space, the via media, between the Catholics (Gonzaga) and Protestants (Whitworth).

A Reminder from the Finance Office By Rosie Banta

As we are beginning to return to "normal", or a new normal, here is a reminder regarding the process for purchase reimbursements. The information below was taken from the Cathedral's Spending Policy approved by Chapter and revised in 2012. A Request For Reimbursement form (Green Slip) and receipt must be submitted with each reimbursement / purchase request. An email may be substituted for the Green Slip as long as all the necessary information is included in the email. If you have any questions, please let me know prior to making a purchase. Expenditures not pre-authorized by the committee chair or staff will not be reimbursed.

There are two types of spending: 1. Pre-authorized major purchases For example, major items which are purchased through a bid process. Once the bid process is complete, the requestor obtains verification of money available to be expended from the Finance Secretary.

2. Pre-authorized other purchases The second type of spending is discretionary funds that are expended prior to funds available verification by the Finance Secretary.

Example: The committee chair sends a committee person to purchase center pieces for a dinner event. The purchase is in the budget. Reimbursement will occur when the receipt along with a pre-authorized form is turned in from the committee chair.

For both the pre-authorized purchase request and the request for reimbursement the reimbursement form needs to be signed by the committee chair/staff member prior to purchase.

All expenditures are paid as funds become available.
