From the Dean By the Very Rev. Heather VanDeventer

Dear Cathedral Family,

The Bazaar was a busy delight, the Parish Thanksgiving Dinner will be here soon, with Thanksgiving to follow. There is snow on the ground, albeit it with leaves still on the trees, streets, and sidewalks. Winter is here and the season of Advent is nigh.

Advent is a liturgical season of preparation for the coming of Christ. We tend to focus our days of preparation on the first coming of Christ and for celebrating the Incarnation of God the Son as manifest in the birth of Jesus, with the feast of the Nativity. Advent calendars of all kinds put us into a countdown mindset – whether we use a traditional Scripture based Advent calendar with a verse from the Gospel according to Luke or Matthew a day, a sweet one like chocolate, or one of seemingly ten thousand other "advent" calendars that may be tasty, fun, or pampering but

probably don't have much to do with Jesus. I do not want to be a grinch – I love the Advent calendars our family has had and used across the years (including the Playmobile set from when my kiddos were small) – but I do wonder if there is another focus that we can hold in Advent so that we can keep Advent and not join in the rush (led by retailers and commercialism) to get to Christmas and Jesus' birth too soon.

There is a group of clergy and liturgical scholars who have created an effort called the Advent Project. While the Cathedral is not participating in it, I am intrigued by it. The Advent Project seeks to offer formation and in that bring deeper meaning to the path we walk through Advent. Have you ever scratched your head upon listening to the readings and the Gospel passages that we hear after All Saints Sunday (always the beginning of November) through to the Third Sunday in Advent? If these passages have

washed over you, I invite you to pause, listen, and re-read them this year. The readings across these 5 to 6 Sundays feel out of step with the wider culture that rushes to Christmas because they are.

The readings which we hear across November and December, until the fourth Sunday of Advent, are focused on the Reign and Kingdom of God and on how the Reign of God is made manifest in Creation and the World – both now and in the end. These readings sound apocalyptic because they are -but not in the way that the *Left* Behind novels and preachers on late night TV suggest. The "end times" in these passages from the Bible are about the end of the world as we know it yet as that means the reshaping of the world to match the purposes for which God created the world. The Reign of God is one where God's desire for order, blessing, and care of one another is made manifest by you, me, and everyone -- go re-read Genesis chapter 1 to see again what God does in continued on page 4

And just like that, it's winter! As we look ahead towards the busy-ness of Advent and Christmas it is sometimes easy to fill our minds with 'wants' rather than reflecting on the 'haves' which already surround us. It sometimes seems that Thanksgiving, or at least the articulation and expression of gratitude that I associate with Thanksgiving, tends to take a back-seat while we prepare for one of the busiest times of the calendar (and church!) year. However, allow me to pause to share with you the many 'haves' for which I am grateful:

The members of the Music Ministry: folks who not only sing to the Glory of God on Sunday mornings, but who also give of their time and talents many times a week in myriad unseen ways; bringing joy, guidance, leadership, and assistance to the many aspects of an active music program: robe maintenance, music filing, program editing, fellowship planning, spiritual reflections, ride-sharing, set-up/tear-down, repertoire research, translating texts, and proof-reading programs, are some of the many, MANY, ways the members of our music ministry voluntarily contribute to our program.

As our Cathedral Choir numbers continue to increase, so do the number of ringers in our Bell Choir. I am grateful for continued energy and sense of community being cultivated in and across our Cathedral Ringers.

I continue to delight in the energy and commitment of the young singers in our Junior Choir; though a little reduced in numbers this season they are

singing stronger and more confidently than ever before.

Our Sunday evening service also continues to gain support and attendance, as we work to discern the right blend and balance of music styles which will meet the spiritual needs of our congregation.

Our community outreach and partnerships continue to grow with monthly offerings of Evensong Services, Music Series Concerts, or guest presentations such as the Spokane Symphony Orchestra, Chorale, and Chamber Singers *Messiah*, November 18 and 19. For tickets visit spokanesymphony.org.

On November 20th our Cathedral Choir will be joined by some of the young women from Mukogawa Fort Wright Institute. As part of their English immersion program, they will join us for worship, music, and... Thanksgiving dinner!

On November 26th, our Junior Choir and Sunday School children will sing for the Holiday Kick-Off Event at the MAC, and will be joined by young singers from across several denominations. (If you are interested in singing at this event you can email me for details)

And, finally, on November 27th at 5:00pm we will present our annual Advent Lessons and Carols service, featuring ALL our Music Ensembles.

I have much to be thankful for and a simple THANK YOU doesn't even begin to summarize the gratitude I feel to be a part of the joy our Music Ministry continues to bring to our congregation and greater community. Water By John Wallingford

There are 641 uses of the word water in the Bible. Seventy one percent of the Earth's surface is water. About 60% of your body weight is water. It's fair to say that life depends on water.

I listened to a webinar on the 'modernization' of the 1964 Columbia River treaty co-hosted by Save Our Wild Salmon at which Jessica Zimmerle from Earth Ministries (the Washington State branch of Interfaith power and light) and DR Michel (Upper Columbia United Tribes) spoke. You can find it here. That treaty between US and Canada set parameters for flood control and hydroelectric power generation, and with negotiations open, there is interest by Tribes and others to add a third element to the treaty: ecosystem function. It seems obvious now that the ecosystem should have driven decisions on the Columbia.

The National Academy of Sciences recently published a report on the Future of Lake Coeur d'Alene which will be discussed on Nov 15 at the Hagadone Event center in Coeur d'Alene, more information here. That report cautions that phosphates in fertilizer run off could mobilize heavy metals in the lake sediment. Parishioner Jess Jordan works day in and day out to apply the Clean Water Act in our area; the first case heard by the Supreme Court of the US this fall explores the definition of the word 'adjacent' as applied to wetlands, potentially affecting about half of all wetlands in the US. That case originates in our backvard at Priest Lake. Jim Ekins from University of Idaho extension oversees a master water stewards program and teaches practical knowledge on water use and management. The Coeur d'Alene seeks to create a water passage from Hangman creek to the lake for migratory salmon, bypassing Spokane Falls. Gloria Flora, one of our speakers last April tells me biochar is being used by Spokane City in purification of effluent water. The ocean ecosystem is threatened by atmospheric carbon dioxide equilibrating in water to form carbonic acid, which dissolves the shells of crustaceans. New parishioner Mike McCarty is teaching about ocean pH in the STEM program. Tom Soeldner has been active for 8 years now leading discussions with the Tribes and Spokane civic leaders of water preservation in the region. It was reported a couple weeks ago that the Spokane River has forever chemicals in it; I am fascinated with the research at University of Washington that uses poplars to remediate contaminated waterways.

The Hope for Creation Conference is coming back, April 22 (Saturday, Earth Day) to focus attention on water: local, regional and global. The city of Spokane, Riverkeepers, Gonzaga's Climate center, our partner Whitworth, Spokane 350 and others are all informed We will use the learnings from the Conference help prepare the city for the 50th anniversary of Expo '74. Besides some great presentations there will be discussion groups and a street fair with exhibits on environmental care, food trucks and live music. Finally, the Faith Leaders Earth Day Vigil is likely to be the closing event. Pray for Care of Water.

Continued from page 1 the creation of all there is. Yes, this is a poetic understanding and not a 20th or 21st century scientific understanding of creation, but look at the verbs used to describe God's work. God creates, sets & separates (creates order), gives direction, and blesses.

Over and over again, God blesses and calls what is created good. So God's Reign is one where there is justice, peace, and stewardship of creation. These are what we hope for when God's Reign and Kingdom come in fullness. Humankind is to be in partnership with God and co-creators of the Reign of God – when we live into that call, we also work for justice, peace, and stewardship of creation.

As you prepare for Thanksgiving, considering gratitude and blessings, pray and give thanks for ways that we can use the riches of creation rightly – this is a way of making God's reign manifest. This Advent, as you prepare to journey to Bethlehem and to make space for the Christ Child in your home, consider also how you can work and live in ways of justice and peace, knowing that those are the ways of the Reign of God. And in any season, pause and consider, seeking direction for how each of us can care for one another, for the neighbor and the stranger, and for the Earth in ways that are Kingdom ways and in partnership with the God who created us, loves us, and guides us always.

Her understanding of how to run a meeting is top notch; she leads competently and with humor. Her sermons and presentations are profound.

I was very impressed with Skip Hubbard's update on Camp Cross and the capital campaign. What those volunteers have accomplished at Camp is just short of amazing. They have transformed cabins, got traffic buoys in the beach area, and acquired a more "modern" van, all with a lot of sweat equity and great economy.

Father David Siblev and Dean Heather VanDeventer along with other deputies including Pia Longonitti and Katherine Karr-Cornejo did presentations on the General Convention and provided updates on the innovative and challenging work of the wider Episcopal Church in several areas. I must say I am moved by its thoughtful process and careful self-examination and proud to be an Episcopalian. Finally, it was fun to work with Father Arlen Farley and his committee on the Resolutions of Courtesy. This is a sincere and tongue-in-cheek process: lots of humor and love. I also really enjoyed the participation of the children of the Diocese, in running coffee, and other errands. They are the icing on the cake.

As the Bishop reminded us, no one leaves the path, and no one walks alone. We try new things and learn from them. We keep walking with Jesus as creative, compelling witnesses in the Inland Northwest... strengthening, growing, and planting congregations.

Sunday Forum: Welcoming Immanuel

As we prepare to begin a new church year and observe Advent once again, we are called to wait and reflect upon Jesus' coming. Even those who do not share our faith are familiar with Jesus coming as a human child, born to humble circumstances, God incarnate on earth. Fewer may be familiar with Jesus' second coming in glory, signifying the completion of God's purpose. To focus on the baby, we look to the past. To focus on the second coming, we look to the future.

But we live in the present. How do we prepare to welcome Jesus in the here and now?

As we walk together towards and through advent this year, we will move through a series of sessions about hospitality and the stranger. We're excited to work with this gift from the diocese

Vietnamese-American artist and theologian Phuc Luu writes:

In ancient cultures, the stranger was someone in whom hospitality was extended. To welcome the stranger was to welcome the company of the divine. This series of videos is about those we might consider other, stranger, foreigner, and alien. These are the people often on the margins of society, and treated as such. They might be the migrant, those who are of different religious or cultural backgrounds, those who live in neighborhoods of different social economic classes, those who simply look, act, and behave differently.

Whenever we encounter something new, often we are challenged. Our comfortable world feels intruded. The saying, *"birds of a feather flock"* together" speaks about our affinity toward sameness. not *difference*. We are naturally drawn to what is like us. But if this is the case, then how can we know something new? How can we come to recognize the presence of an infinite God, if all we are seeking is to confirm what we already know about God? It might be that salvation does not lie in the familiar, but that which comes to us as different, as the other and the stranger.

In this series we will learn about God through practices of hospitality and reflections on the surprising places we may not think to look for the divine, in preparation for welcoming our Savior again and again. Join us Sundays at 9:15 am in the Great Hall, November 20-December 18.

Volunteer Opportunities at The Windfall

I volunteer at The Windfall three Fridays a month. This little thrift store serves people with limited means as well as treasure hunters. But there is another ministry that seems even more important to me. I will share some of these stories over the next few issues of The Chimes, and will start with this one. There is a woman in her mid 40s who routinely comes in with a young boy, about 11 years old. His sight is very limited; he carries a white cane. I think she is his caregiver, not his mom. He always makes a bee-line for the toys. The deal is that he gets to choose one (most are 50 cents). This is a very deliberate process for him. He and his companion have some conversation, but he takes his time. Last Friday, he chose a bug catcher kit. He came up to pay with his wrinkled dollar bill. I rang up his purchase, while his companion coached him to say "please" and "thank you" and helped him wrangle the change. Then, we all said "good-bye" and they headed out into the rain.
