### Dear Cathedral Family,

Both in the deanery and in the Cathedral, we have set the Advent wreath and begun the process of some modest decorations. At the house, we have two nested wreaths on the front door and greenery and lights waiting to be placed. While Advent started on Sunday, November 29, our Advent calendar—a lovely reusable lighthouse reminiscent of the Maine coast-has just started to be filled with a few drawers containing small chocolates and with slips of paper. The slips of paper are for things to do on that particular day in Advent. Some slips require reading portions of the Gospel according to Mark, others to write a prayer for Advent, some to do a household task without being asked, and others still to give someone a call just to chat. While the slips of paper are aimed at our kids (see "doing a household task without being asked"...), truth be told that there are things that David and I should do as well as part of our Advent journey. During Advent we wait. We watch and keep a lookout, staying alert. We work for the spread of the reign of God and the building of the Beloved Community. And we actively prepare for the in-breaking of God once again, and again and again and again, into our world.

As we wait, watch, stay awake, work, and prepare, we do so to be ready for Christmas. We get and make ready to celebrate the Incarnation, the birth of God Emmanuel, the coming of Jesus the Christ. Whether once again or for the first time in a long while, we prepare in our hearts a room, a mansion, a city where Jesus can make a home. We will celebrate Christmas in the ways that we can, knowing that this year is different. Faithful people for centuries have celebrated Christmas in more adverse conditions than we face today. And have truly celebrated the gift of God's grace upon grace being given in the Word made flesh.

At St. John's Cathedral, we are also making plans in case we are able to be together for inperson worship inside the Cathedral for an extended Christmas Eve. Please read these next sentences carefully as I explain "in case we are able to be together." I hope that we can gather together for in-person worship inside the Cathedral for Christmas Eve. I am in consultation with Chapter about what level of risk we find acceptable. We look at the number of positive COVID-19 cases across a time period (14 days and also longer). We consider the percentage of filled beds, both regular and ICU, in the hospitals in Spokane and our wider region. We consider formulas that look at positive COVID-19 tests in our county and extrapolate how many other may be positive but are untested (due to being asymptomatic or due to refusing to be tested). We also consider the collective mental, emotional, and spiritual health of the congregation. We all miss being together. We weigh the risks and recognize that there are only so many factors that we can control, as well as many unknowns. Chapter will meet on December 15 for these considerations, amongst other Chapter business.

If the clergy and Chapter reach consensus that the risk is tolerable, then the Cathedral will offer four "Christmas Eve" services for inperson worship inside the Cathedral. Attendance will be capped at 25 households per service. These services are open to Cathedral member households only, not to the general public. Reservations will be required in order to maintain our records for contact tracing and to ensure that physical distancing in the Cathedral can be kept. Masks will be required to be worn for the whole service by everyone inside the Cathedral.

These Christmas Eve services would happen on the evenings of December 21, 22, and 23, and the afternoon of December 24. Because it is not safe for the congregation to sing together, and to limit the amount of time we spend together inside, the worship service will be a brief Christmas Eve Eucharist without the singing of congregational hymns. Music will be offered on the organ and by a soloist. And we will be able to carefully share in the Eucharist, following protocols established during the outdoor worship services this past summer.

In the evening of December 24, Christmas Eve, we will livestream the traditional Christmas Eve worship with Scripture, prayers, sermon, hymns, and the Eucharist, offering a prayer of spiritual communion.

More information about these in -person and livestream services will be forthcoming on and after December 17 in Cathedral Connections emails; or by calling the office, 9am-4pm weekdays, Dec 17-23.

### From the Priest Associate

I'm doing something a little different with my *Chimes* column this month. We've started Advent and gathering in-person still presents safety risks. We're worshiping online as an act of caring for each other. This is a shared hardship and a high participation barrier for some of us. It's frankly not working for some of us, but it's also what we have right now and nearly every week our liturgy team is taking what we are learning and making things better. That's why I was encouraged to hear from one family in our congregation who has found ways to make it work for them. I'm making my column this month a conversation with them about making online worship meaningful at home. Meredith Shimizu serves our parish on Chapter and also serves on the Family Ministry Committee. She is an Associate Professor of Art at Whitworth University. Your situation might be quite different than Meredith's so just take whatever you an use in this interview and apply it to your situation:

### Thanks for talking with us, Meredith. Tell us a bit about yourself and your family.

My husband, Toshi, and I have two children: Emma (5th grade) and Mies (2nd). We hail from Chicago, but moved to Spokane in 2008 when I started teaching at Whitworth. We've been involved at St. John's for about three years.

What are Sundays like for you and your family in quarantine?

We've developed a routine that involves some family time. We join Morning Prayer through Facebook. We line up on the couch with our coloring pages and loads of markers. (Sometimes various members of the family "opt out" of the couch or of church altogether, which is okay.) We actually all color during parts of the service, joining in the hymns and prayers. We like to see what's new each week—new flowers, new vestments, new camera angles, new masks!—and look forward to hearing John at the organ, Old 100th (Emma's favorite), and the choir's latest collaboration. After the service, we extend our family time by watching an episode of the British Baking Show. Not exactly liturgical, but it's nice to keep cuddling on the couch.

What is challenging for you and your family about online worship and what is working well?

Well, we are a little distracted. It's hard to focus on all the readings and sermon sometimes—with pets trying to climb on the couch, someone looking for a missing marker, and debates about whether John is wearing his "organ jeans" this week. And we have had our share of technical difficulties. But, we are excited to head to the couch every Sunday morning and we have found a lot of joy in this routine!

What is similar and different in experiencing online worship with children vs. in-person worship?

I do feel like I can concentrate on the liturgy, readings, and sermon much more when I'm worshiping in person and my children are not tempted to do a running commentary on the service. For the same reason, they probably listen more closely when we're in the Cathedral, too. But we feel connected to the liturgical staff-perhaps even more so than if we were worshiping in person. And, most importantly, online worship has brought worship into our home, which is exciting to me, even if it's a little rough around the edges.

How has your experience changed over the course of the last many months?

It took us a while to figure out this routine. Getting the coloring pages from the church this fall really helped because it allowed us to engage our own creativity during worship. Our routine will probably change a little during Advent. We'll see! I hope this conversation normalizes some of the challenges you might be experiencing around online worship and also stokes your imagination for giving it another shot if you tried a while ago and it didn't work. As a reminder, the diocese has also created a simple liturgy you can use at home and I highly recommend it. It's available on their website every week. If you are inspired by the idea of coloring during worship, but don't have an online worship coloring book, shoot me an email. There's no age limit for these books!

### Cathedral Life By Karen Byrne

We have found another reason for Thanksgiving this year. The crew agreed that it was such a wonderful opportunity to do something tangible that we felt doubly blessed! We made contact with Sharon, the social worker, thanks to our member Kristi Philip. We will be looking for additional ways to be in touch with our neighbors. BTW, did you know that Canterbury Court is the first of two senior low-income living complexes that St. John's has been able to start in the Spokane area? The other one is Winchester Court on North Cook Street.

We are working to be in touch with neighborhoods with updated information so that we can be of service with Simple Gifts and the Giving Tree. (see articles elsewhere in the *Chimes*). Most of you will be hearing from your neighborhood captains, with a note or a call. We are still looking for volunteers who would be willing to be a captain, with responsibility to contact your list by email (or phone) once a quarter.
