From the Dean By the Very Rev. Heather VanDeventer

Dear Cathedral Family,

Many of you know of and have read at least one of the works of C. S. Lewis. Clive Staples Lewis, "apologist and spiritual writer" as the Church calls him, was a professor, prolific author of fiction and non-fiction for children and adults, and a person who rediscovered his Christian faith after times of trial and testing. The Episcopal Church remembers him on November 22. I have been spending some time with Lewis' life and writings, between marking his remembrance at a Wednesday Eucharist and especially in preparing for our Advent series of reading and discussing The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe with the youth groups.

Lewis was born in 1898, raised in an Anglican household in Belfast and later educated at Oxford, building a foundation for a career in the university. He also faced many trials and tragedies in his teens and twenties. His mother died of cancer when he was ten. He attended a series of boarding schools, some better than others, and also dealt with his own health issues as a young teen. During World War One, he was trained for the officer corps and served in the trenches of France until he wounded. His convalescence was impacted by depression and having seen the horrors of war. All of these led Lewis to set aside his faith, to lose hope, and to declare himself an atheist.

Lewis did recover physically and mentally, while still carrying scars of those traumas. He returned to university, later became a fellow and tutor, and joined in circles of friendship. One of these circles was known as the Inklings. In conversations with J. R. R. Tolkien, Dorothy L. Sayers, Charles Williams, and others, Lewis found his Christian faith being rekindled. His hope for humanity and the world was also rekindled and his pessimism was

receding. Lewis spoke of mentally and spiritually kicking, struggling, and trying to escape from God during his return to belief in God and in God as known in Jesus Christ, later writing of himself that he was the "most dejected and reluctant convert in all of England."

I think it is out of Lewis' internal faith struggle that he kept writing, using fiction and non-fiction, to continue to explain how in a world with tragedies large and small, with wars, with divisions and hatred, that nonetheless God is real. I think Lewis wrote to show that we do not live in an eternal winter where it is never Christmas. Emmanuel. God-With-Us, is still at work in the world and at work through you and me. Lewis wrote to share the faith he came to know, that faith in Jesus brings courage, comfort, and even surprising jov.

The Epistle passage assigned for

C. S. Lewis' remembrance in our

calendar is from First Peter, including this portion:
In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, so that the genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. Although you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an

indescribable and glorious joy, for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls. (1 Peter 1:6-9)

This December, we journey through Advent while waiting and watching expectantly. We sojourn with one another and contemplate themes of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love across these four weeks. We arrive at the manger on Christmas Eve with the generations stretching back to the shepherds and

angels. Even in the midst of the trials of our day – including concerns about new COVID variants, local & world economies, justice delivered and justice denied, and how "normal" keeps shifting – our faith meets God's trust in us to be with humanity Incarnate as a wee baby then and still present with us today. In all of these, the opportunity is there to rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy. Some days, that joy is the size of a mustard seed. Other days, it is the size of the mountains or the Palouse or the starlit sky or of the imagination of Narnia.

This Christmas, after your Advent of expectant waiting, come to worship and be in prayer in thanksgiving for the mysterious and amazing gift of the Incarnation. Come to sing the hymns and carols. Come to be fed with the living bread of the Eucharist. Come and *rejoice* with an indescribable and glorious joy.

The Nominating Committee will draft a slate of candidates to present at the 30 January Annual Meeting. Their bios and photos will be sent to you for your review via an email announcement. Information will also be included in the Chimes and Sunday bulletins.

Who can be nominated to serve on Chapter? This is a list that isn't in our by-laws or governed by the diocese or the national church, but is more in the realm of best practices.

A nominee may NOT be immediate family to a clergy or staff member; including spouse, parents, sibling, child, in-law, and steprelationships immediate family to someone who is already serving on Chapter a paid staff member

A nominee must be a pledging member of the Cathedral a member of the Cathedral for a few years prior to nomination faithful in attendance at worship; be a mature Christian, prayerful, calm and thoughtful, and connected to the Cathedral and Episcopal Church committed to the overall health and well-being of the Cathedral as a whole, not just one ministry, committee, or area of Cathedral life

Prior service on a committee at the Cathedral is helpful but not required.

Chapter is different from a business or non-profit board. Being on Chapter means that members are engaging in the spiritual leadership of the congregation, as well as the business leadership.

New candidates for Chapter should bring particular talents, skills, expertise, and backgrounds that Chapter needs to round out its skills and help it to do its work most effectively.

The term is 3 years. The Youth Chapter member term is variable, a year or more, depending on when the student leaves high school and goes on to further education or training.

Needlepoint Kneelers

In the Fall of 2019, before the pandemic, I had altar duty and was setting up for communion in the sacristy. There was a tap on the door, and a couple introduced themselves, and said they had some questions about the Cathedral. They were from Australia. I did my best to answer their questions, but one I had to get back to them on. The woman said that she was a volunteer at a boys' school in Australia, and they needed to re-do their kneelers. Could I send her the pattern? I remember the kneelers were dedicated shortly after I joined the Cathedral in 1999. I talked to a couple people who were involved in the project at the time, and this is what I learned.

"We don't really have a pattern. The theme is flowers and creatures that live in the Diocese. We wrote to all the churches in the Diocese and asked them to send lists of wild or crop flowers and insects from their area, as well as if they had any needle pointers who would like to work on the project

"Dorothy Marsden wanted to create new kneelers and gave about \$5000 for the project. We didn't really know where to start, but we prayed about it. Judy Anderson had a friend in Portland who had designed needlepoint flower kneelers for her cathedral. She came to Spokane and really got us going. After that we met once a week in the Great Hall and traced flowers out of flower books. We cut them out and glued them onto a piece of paper the size of the kneelers. Then we put colors on them, matching the flowers as best we could. Judy knew about getting the yarn from her friend in Coeur d'Alene and also the canvas.

"We liked the blue background because it went well with the blue in the stained glass windows, and we wanted jewel-toned bright colors for the flowers. Judy transferred our drawings onto the canvas, and ordered the yarn. We had chosen our 12 stitchers—they had done samples for us. We all met. Judy gave us all the

Please keep the Nominating Committee in your prayers as we carry out this task. directions on how the stitches were to be done, we handed out the canvas and yarn, and the stitching began officially. We met every other week to give out extra yarn and for Judy to answer questions. As everyone got comfortable we didn't meet as often. One of us was convener and keeper of the yarn Bishop Jack Wyatt put in a few stitches. Needle pointing was a hobby of his. Bruce Whitehouse built us a chest where we kept the old kneelers and exchanged them when we thought the new ones needed protection.

"About a year later, since we had quite a bit of yarn left we decided to do the kneelers in All Saints Chapel. We chose the theme from the hymn, "I Sing a Song of the Saints of God." The sections for those kneelers were much smaller, so it went much faster. "

Hats off to the women of the Cathedral, and God bless them.

Our children and youth ministries came back together in person at the start of the new program year. It's been really wonderful to be together again and deeply worthwhile, I think, in spite of the covid challenges that are still very much with us. With children's relatively recent access to vaccination, we all hope that our life together is getting more and more safe. I want to share a bit of what these gatherings have been like.

Lisa Church and Sarah Robertson had the idea for regathering Sunday School by using these first few months together to re-orient children to the what and why of our life in worship. Combining scavenger hunts inside and outside of the Cathedral with Godly play lessons from scripture, pilgrimages to see the holy work of our altar guild and holy things in our sacristy, as well as guests visits with Jennifer Ogden (who knows so much about the architecture of this place), myself, and Liesel Kittlitz (outgoing president of Altar Guild).

It's been really inspiring and exciting to see our children walking around the campus with a deeper sense of ownership and wonder. Several children have told me stories, unprompted, about their Sunday school experiences with just these

characteristics. Newer children in our community are increasingly feeling like this is their church and God's church. Children who have grown SO much since March 2020, but haven't gotten to be in physical Christian community with each other in that time and haven't been in this place are excited to be here and to be together.

In addition to welcoming new families this fall, we had a really special visit from Bishop Gretchen a few weeks ago. My favorite part of that gathering was what she shared about prayer. She sat down at the children's level (on a children's chair) and shared that her favorite way to pray is to close her eyes and imagine Jesus is right there in front of her. She talks to him and imaginatively listens to him. Sometimes she talks to Mary, too, about faithfulness. What else do we gather for, in Christian community, if not to pray and learn how to pray?

Meanwhile, our senior high youth from around Spokane have been growing in a weekly rhythm of dinner, transformational learning, and prayer. Some of our youth have invited their friends to join the community, a gift to them and to the rest of us. Our youth have clarified values and norms for our gatherings

and we have spent the early fall talking about the power of language, names, and blessing in conversation with the texts across the book of Genesis. They have responded to these stories in conversation, in writing their own blessings, and in painting. There is a lot of laughter and insight in these times together and an increasing safety for taking risks in sharing the harder parts of our experience with one another. New Sr. High Youth are always welcome!

Youth in Sr. High are also invited to the annual Teens Encountering Christ weekend in January. Registration is open now for this youth led experience of unconditional love. Get in touch with me (arlenf@stjohns-cathedral.org) for more details.

The Flow

I signed up to get email notifications about TED talks. Usually, I delete them when I'm clearing out the overnight junk. Just don't have time for that. But in the quiet of early Thanksgiving morning I chose to watch Wharton professor Adam Grant's 15 minute talk Flow (https://www.ted.com/talks/ad-

am grant how to stop languishing a nd start finding flow).

Grant describes a manner of living common under covid in the single word languishing, the neglected middle child of mental health. Nothing seems to hold our attention or sense of purpose very long. We play games on the phone in bed. We might feel aimless, joyless as we muddle through. Grant was speaking to me; my do list is longer than ever and I'm less efficient than ever, trapped in a cycle of frustration. Grant's antidote is Flow, what athletes call the Zone, when you give yourself the gift of uninterrupted time to stay focused, so much that you can lose your sense of time and even your sense of self. I think that is what Jesus was saying when he answered the Pharisee in Matt 22:37, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind." Jesus was saying that experiencing the Flow, with God, is the most important thing we can do.

When was the last time you allowed yourself to have that peak experience with God, all your heart and mind and

soul? For many it is in worship on Sunday, putting the demands of the world aside, listening to the music, gazing at stained glass, wrestling with the preacher's teaching, praying for persons and the earth, passing the peace, sharing bread and wine. The key to that experience is mindfulness. Grant says the difference between languish and Flow, is that Flow requires active participation in the real world. For our worship to be a peak experience, we parishioners have to actively participate in God's world. Grant says the linchpin to Flow is knowing you make a difference to other people. What does that mean for us in church? Jesus next words to the Pharisee were, love thy neighbor as thyself. To rephrase that in Grant's terminology sounds a lot like getting into the Flow with your neighbor. Take the time to be with that person, to hear their story. Such a simple thing (why do we find this so hard?) is elevated to the second greatest commandment! Flow can be enjoyed together.

On days I have a list of calls to make or emails to write for the Hope for Creation Conference (HFC) and I feel I'm languishing, I now call to mind that all this effort is for the purpose of inviting others to wonder at the beauty and mystery of life on earth, and to actively participate in care of that beautiful, mysterious world. We've added discussion sessions to HFC so we can listen to concerns and hopes of others. HFC is a way to respond to the great commandments, washing away languish.
