In-person Worship

It is an understatement to say this past year has been challenging. The individual and collective mental, emotional, and spiritual health of the congregation has suffered. We all miss being together.

As vaccinations continue to increase, we are cautiously offering in-person worship, Holy Eucharist, Rite II, **on Sundays at 10:45am, through June 13.**

We will continue to offer our online worship at 9am, via Facebook and YouTube, with outside communion at the Welcome Center patio offered 10:45am-noon, through June 13.

On **Sunday, June 20**, our Sunday worship service schedule will shift. We will resume the 8am worship service as a spoken (no music) Rite I (traditional language) Eucharist with sermon.

We will also combine our current 9am livestream and 10:45am in-person worship services into one hybrid worship service at 10:30am. This worship service will be the Eucharist with sermon, music, and hymns, with the more contemporary language of Rite II and Enriching our Worship. As part of this hybrid service, we will also livestream the service. The link for this online service will still be sent in each week's Friday Cathedral Connections

The in-person worship services are not exactly like our pre-pandemic services. Attendance is capped at 30 households per service. At this time, these services are open to Cathedral member households only, not to the general public. Reservations are required in order to maintain our records for contact tracing and to ensure that physical distancing in the Cathedral

Online Worship

We continue to offer **Holy Eucharist, Rite 2, on Sundays at 9am, through June 13**, with a carillon prelude beginning at 8:45am. This service includes organ and hymns, and is live-streamed on our [Facebook page](#). If you're not able to tune in as we broadcast, you can go to the Facebook page anytime afterward and play the video. We also livestream the services on YouTube, with that link being provided in each week's Friday Cathedral Connections.

Persons who would like to receive communion may come to the Cathedral's Welcome Center patio, 10:45am-noon, through **June 13**, and receive communion outside. Those with mobility issues may remain in their car in the circle drive and the clergy will bring communion to them.

Holiday Hours

The Cathedral offices will be closed Memorial Day, **Monday, May 31**. Persons wanting to visit the Columbarium can do so during the regular work week, by appointment with the secretary.

The Cathedral offices will be closed on **Monday, July 5**, in observance of Independence Day.

From the Dean

Dear Cathedral Family,

It is June and the Cathedral clergy and staff are preparing for some summer changes. These changes will come once we have entered the season after Pentecost – of the Great Green Growing Season as Godly Play friends call it. Some changes will mirror what often happens in the summer, as the program year comes to a close. Other changes are part of the Cathedral's continuing journey of regathering after time spent under coronavirus precautions.

The Sunday Forum will have two final sessions on the Letter to the Romans on **June 6** and **June 13**. Then the Sunday Forum will go on its summer break until late September. The Adult Faith Formation committee is making plans for the fall. Also watch your email (or call the Cathedral office) for information about a Cathedral summer book read, with possible book groups. I want to thank the AFF committee for its dedication to offering Sunday forums on zoom during this program year.

Sunday school and youth ministries will shift their ways and schedules of gathering this summer as well. There will be family fellowship gatherings, as well as youth-only gatherings, each month this summer. If you do not have children or youth but want to help support these gatherings or Family Ministries in general, please be in touch with Father Arlen. Also, if you are a parent or a grandparent with children or youth nearby and do not receive emails from the Family Ministries committee or Elaine Patrick, our regional youth minister, please reach out so that we may include you in these communications. We would love to engage more families, children, and youth in these efforts as we learn and laugh together, and share Christ's love for one another.

On Sunday, **June 20**, our Sun-

day worship service schedule will shift. We will resume the 8:00 am worship service as a spoken (no music) Rite I (traditional language) Eucharist with sermon. I am looking forward to seeing our 8 o'clock regulars, as well as new faces, back in the Cathedral.

We will also combine our current 9am livestream and 10:45am in-person worship services into one hybrid worship service at 10:30am. This worship service will be the Eucharist with sermon, music, and hymns, with the more contemporary language of Rite II and Enriching our Worship. As part of this hybrid service, we will also livestream the service. By sharing the service via Facebook Live and YouTube, the Cathedral has reached out to those who have never been inside the buildings before, those who have not been able to attend in-person worship for years, as well as the congregation during coronavirus precautions. Some of you even joined worship from the lake! It is out of our mission to share the Gospel, in this case through worship in the beauty of holiness, that we will continue to livestream our 10:30 am worship service. Over the summer, we will have a chance to refine how we can share the worship service from our distinctive space – there will be considerations about camera placement, microphones, and more. In advance, I ask for your patience and thank you in advance for your flexibility in those early weeks of hybrid worship.

As contact tracing is still being strongly encouraged by the Washington state health department, as well as physical distancing between households, we will continue to ask you to sign up to attend either the 8am or the 10:30am in-person worship services. You can sign up by using the link in the Monday Cathedral Connections email, or by calling the Cathedral office. At present, we will continue to limit sign-ups to 30 households. As the summer continues and vaccinations in

the Spokane region progress, we will watch for changes in the amount of distance required between households and respond accordingly. The south transept will continue to be the main entrance into the Cathedral for Sunday worship, with the welcome center doors being available for those with mobility needs.

Each person in worship over the age of 4 needs to wear a face mask covering nose and mouth; this requirement will continue through the summer, possibly longer. Since we have children under the age of 12 regularly attending worship services, and since they cannot as yet be vaccinated, we will continue to show love of neighbor by wearing masks. Face masks are also required in all parts of the Cathedral's buildings for the time being.

In addition to the Sunday morning services, Father Paul Phillips offers a spoken Eucharist two Fridays a month at 10am in the Great Hall. See the calendar for particular dates. No pre-registration is required for these services, but face masks must be worn and all who attend need to sign in when they arrive.

Committees and small groups are now allowed to meet inside the Cathedral's buildings. Face masks are required to be worn for these meetings as well. Before planning a meeting where food or beverages will be offered, the committee or group lead will need to speak with the Dean or the office administrator. As in prior years, these gatherings need to be scheduled with the Cathedral office. We look forward to seeing you in the Guild rooms and Ellis conference center again.

Later in June, the Cathedral will resume being open to the public from 10am to 3pm, three days a week. The Welcome Center doors will be open during this time. Please note that the kitchen door will no longer be unlocked and used for general entrance into Jewett House. For those of you who have been long-time parishioners of the Cathedral, this is a

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change to a time-honored tradition. It does, however, allow the Cathedral to comply with food health safety regulations. Thank you for your help in making this shift.

Phew! All of this makes our life together feel complicated and yet, there is great joy in the ways in which we are regathering. As I noted earlier, we are entering the Great Green Growing Season of the Church year. The Cathedral will soon be dressed in green and our beautiful, hand-worked frontal will return to the crossing altar. The plants and animals that are on it speak to the beauty of creation, its variety and splendor. The natural world around us responds to the warmth of the sun with growth as well – in trees, flowers, and grasses, in gardens we may have at our homes and in the Cathedral’s Community Garden. The seeds you received prior to Palm Sunday may have sprouted (or may still be sitting on your kitchen table in their packet, if gardening is not your thing). Growth after fallow and quiet time is all around us.

There is also growth for each of us after the odd sabbatical, fallow, and possibly quiet time that the past 15 months have been. We continue to carry griefs and burdens from these months. For some, the griefs are in response to the deaths of those we know and love. For others, the griefs are the anxieties and concerns which have presented in these months. For many of our younger families, they are still exhausted from a time of keeping everything on track, or at least trying to do so. And for all of us, we have called upon God in prayer and for help in these months, possibly in different ways than before in our lives.

As we regather both at the Cathedral and in the other places of our lives, as we see those who we haven’t seen for a while, as we start to see whole faces not covered by masks, we enter new spaces of growth and of growth with God. I

invite you to take stock of what “normal” things from the BC (that is, before covid) times that you want to bring forward to now. What “normal” things do you want to leave behind? These are questions that I am considering with Arlen, the staff, and lay leaders for our life together as the Cathedral. I do not have a list or set of answers yet – I am taking the Great Green Growing season to heart and making space to think and listen, including intentional time to listen to the leading and nudging of the Holy Spirit. Some of this intentional time will happen on some road trips when I will be out of the office this summer. (I love a good road trip for extended conversation!) Some of this intentional time will be spent with others at the Cathedral, including Arlen, the liturgy staff, and the wardens.

I invite you to take time over these next weeks in prayer with two collects from the Book of Common Prayer. I think the first speaks to each of us in our personal lives. The second speaks to what we as the Church, both in and beyond the Cathedral congregation, are called to do as followers of Jesus.

Almighty and merciful God, in your goodness keep us, we pray, from all things that may hurt us, that we, being ready both in mind and body, may accomplish with free hearts those things which belong to your purpose; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. (Collect for Proper 2, p.228).

Keep, O Lord, your household the Church in your steadfast faith and love, that through your grace we may proclaim your truth with boldness, and minister your justice with compassion; for the sake of our Savior Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. (Collect for Proper 6, p.229)

At the end of February, St. John’s Cathedral was accepted to participate in the first cohort of the Resilient Church Project through Whitworth’s Office of Church Engagement. Here is how the Office for Church Engagement describes the work of the Resilient Church project: *Your congregation will join seven other local churches of varying traditions, communities, and worship/theological expressions. Together we will seek to develop a deeper root system in the historic Christian faith, to better understand our cultural contexts, and to adapt resourcefully and creatively to new circumstances, challenges, and opportunities in ways that serve the Gospel.*

Scarlett is a native of Spokane and just graduated from Whitworth University as a Global Sociology major with minors in Theology and Political Science. Daybreak Youth Services

This organization provides residential substance abuse treatment for young women (teens). The program, in addition to treating substance abuse, also includes mental health and family counseling. Schooling is provided to residential clients as well as skill building exercises. Daybreak has recently become the only recognized residential and treatment center in Washington for female victims of sex trafficking.

Community Garden Update

The Cathedral’s community garden, just a bit east of the Cathedral near Paulsen House, is up and running for the gardening season. An enthusiastic group of gardeners, some from the Cathedral, some from Canterbury Court and some from the wider community, have planted their beds. The garden expanded from 18 to 34 beds after Eagle Scout Lucas Brown completed his Eagle project last year. That expansion has also provided more of the taller boxes that are easier to manage for people who have difficulty working at ground level. As of Friday, only two boxes were unoccupied. Major helpers in this new look for the garden have been Jennifer Ogden, Ginny Barrett, and Phil Sterlington, as well as Cathedral staff members Richie Parsons and Mbale Katumbe. My family moved to Spokane in August of 2019. Our first spring was a pandemic spring. This year as the Arrowleaf Balsam Root shot up from the primitive edge of the Cathedral Grounds I kept thinking about what an enormous relief they were just before this time last spring when we were carrying something quite heavy and scary and still largely unknown. The arrival of every new flower was a delightful surprise, a reminder that some of the things we can’t control are wonderfully welcome.

This year’s spring has happily coincided with lots of very good news on the pandemic front in the US and our community. Increasing vaccination rates, declining covid cases, the ability to return to in-person gathering for worship, in-person meetings, and CDC guidance that reflects the positive direction we are moving, even with lots of progress remaining and cultural divisions which raise questions about our capacity to get to herd immunity. I have seen many of you in the last two months for the first time in the last year.

This weekend we had a youth leadership gathering for an annual event St. John’s has planned and hosted along with our neighbors at St. Mark’s Lutheran and partners at the diocese for many years. Last year we weren’t able to have the gathering at all and this year our youth, including youth leader Lauren Church, spent months planning for a smaller leadership event. Even though she wasn’t able to participate in this event as it has existed for the last two years, she worked to hand off gifts and knowledge to

upcoming youth leaders so they can experience what she has experienced and offer it to others next year.

The lawn at bicentennial park was filled with youth playing games, sharing stories, and passing wisdom about what is involved in things like public speaking and small group leadership. What a joy to be together this way. A joy to be together, also, in a more contemplative way, with youth on Wednesday nights for Compline in the Cathedral. This more contemplative offering is the result of leadership from Miranda Brown (now on Chapter) and Jeran Jordan.

We also baptized Lilyann this past Sunday during our livestream service. Several families (one of which is fairly new to St. John’s) were able to come to the livestream to celebrate along with Lilyann and all who joined on Facebook and YouTube. We could not celebrate baptisms at Pentecost last year. This year we could and we could even be together to some extent in the celebration.

This summer we hope and plan to get families and youth together again on the lawn of bicentennial park and at various pop-up events around and outside of Spokane. It isn’t summer yet, but it certainly feels like spring this year at St. John’s.

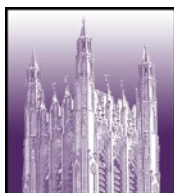
