Dear Cathedral Family,

Summertime is a time for exploration and new learning as much as it is a time for rest and reflection. Yes, schools are on summer break and many of us think back to our childhood summers. Summer camp – whether day camps, sleep away camps, Vacation Bible School weeks, or church camps (Camp Cross among others) – were and still are places where exploration of the world and one’s self happen, with learning woven in that may have not felt like learning in school. Not that there is anything wrong with school! It is just that there is something special and distinct about those summer experiences. For some of you, maybe you did not go to a formal camp but were at the lake, or at home having similar times of exploration and learning. As adults go on vacations or stay close to home on staycations, we lean back into those childhood and youth experiences and find opportunities for exploration and new learnings, as well as rest and reflection. While activities, events, and committee meetings lessen in the summer at the Cathedral, similar to so many churches, it is not a slow time for exploring and learning in the life of faith. Taking a page from Godly Play, a Sunday school curriculum that makes meaning through story, wonder, and play while nurturing the spiritual lives of children, the summer months are part one of the Great Green Growing Season in faith. That’s not just for children but for all of us who are God’s children no matter our age.

**How do you want to grow in seeing and sharing God’s love this summer? How do you want to grow as a disciple and follower of Jesus this summer? How do you want to grow in listening to the Holy Spirit’s song this summer?**

Maybe this summer is the right

time to explore a new prayer practice. You might try the Examen, which comes out of Jesuit traditions (I consider the Jesuits to be the Episcopalians of the Roman Catholic tradition). While there are ways to make it more complex, you can set aside 5-7 minutes usually at the end of the day to pause for 6 simple steps:

- ◆ Center yourself, becoming aware of your surroundings, yourself, and God’s presence with you.
- ◆ Gratitude, recognizing what you are especially thankful for today.
- ◆ Review, think through the day that is past and what brought you joy and what brought you challenge.
- ◆ Turn to God and have a conversation; what could have been said or done differently?
- ◆ Look Forward to the new day to come and consider how to be present to what it will hold.
- ◆ Pray in words, song, or silence.

Maybe you prefer to read a book. You might try a book that could be a summer beach read for those who like science fiction, with the bonus of questions about how to live a Christian life. Katherine Karr-Cornejo (and Auntie’s Books) suggest *Sisters of the Vast Black* by Lina Rather. The novella deals with issues not too far from our day and time – plagues, war, dementia, leadership changes, and being true to one’s calling in faith.

Maybe you like to listen to podcasts. I am not a regular listener to podcasts but I return to *The Way of Love with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry* podcasts every few months. This podcast follows the seven parts of the Way of Love – Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, Rest – and explores different aspects of each in conversation with the podcast hosts, plus Bishop

Curry and special guests from across the Episcopal Church and beyond. A passage from the Bible is usually explored as well.

Or maybe you want to use the summer to be in action and engagement with the world by volunteering with a ministry. The Windfall, the thrift store in Perry District that has been a ministry of the Service League and the Cathedral for 61 years, is in need of volunteers to help in the front of the store and behind the scenes. Our Place Community Outreach in West Central has a food pantry two days a week and is in need of volunteers as well to assist guests with building their grocery bags.

Alternatively, maybe you have felt the nudge to join a ministry at the Cathedral. We are seeking people to join these ministries: lectors, ushers, greeters, chalice bearers and communion ministers, coffee hour team members. The various Guilds and groups at the Cathedral also welcome new members. St. Monica’s motto is “we cook so we can give” and this group of ladies meets once a month in the evening for fellowship and shared time in the Cathedral kitchen. Another ladies guild, St. Nicholas, a guild focused supporting children and youth ministries and organizations, meets monthly over lunch during the day and enjoys fellowship with one another. The Brotherhood of St. John is still meeting via zoom midday weekly and welcomes men to join. The Altar Guild’s purpose is to prepare the Cathedral altars, including flowers, for Sunday and midweek Eucharists and other services; they also gather for fellowship. ## Sacred, Summery Opportunities for all ages at Camp Cross

Camp Cross has been a sacred space for generations in our diocese, 153 acres on a peninsula of the lake with miles of trails, quiet and secluded spots, waterfront recreation, inclusive community, delicious food, and fun! Bishop Gretchen has led a vision for Camp Cross which puts forming disciples of Jesus at the center and expands the formation ministry there to include adults as well as children. This summer the women's and men's weekends are formal camp sessions alongside of family camp, time for Days at the Lake, and sessions for children rising to 2<sup>nd</sup> grade through youth approaching their senior year of High School. All the sessions take up the diocesan-wide theme, "On A Sacred Journey." I encourage you to check out the Camp offerings for adults as well as children and youth this summer. All the Camp sessions close with Eucharist in the beautiful St. Francis outdoor chapel and a Barbecue lunch open to everyone including families picking up their youngsters. Camp Cross is inclusive and affirming of LGBTQ+ persons and requires covid vaccination.

Sara Gunter, Canon for Youth and Family Ministry, is the new director for Camp. She has recruited a strong resource program team for the summer as well as an experienced summer staff including some young adults who are familiar to the St. John's community: Lauren Church, Sammi Hubbard, and Miranda Brown. We are also sending youth as counselors including Matthew Brown and Caison Farley. Please pray for their ministry this summer. And pray for me as I serve as staff chaplain.

**Senior High Camp: July 31 – August 6** Campers entering grades 10-2022 high school graduates will enjoy waterfront, ball field, chapel time, peer-led small groups, daily worship, big camp games, and more! They can also expect to apply camp's core values, beliefs, and practices to developing a spiritually vital and dynamic life in the world.

**Men's Weekend: August 19-21** This is a weekend session of spiritual reflection and renewal for men. You will spend this weekend retreat connecting through group discussion and shared formation. Surrounding these highly impactful times of reflection is an ability to connect on your own personal level with God through a place of peace, beauty, and nearly unblemished nature. To compliment it all is some great food and wonderful hospitality to make this weekend one of the highlights of your summer.

Gospel stories come alive as we place ourselves among the disciples by praying with our imagination.

**Labor Day Family Camp: September 2-5** Looking for a nice spot for the extended Labor Day weekend? Pack your bags and bring the family to Camp Cross for a stay on Lake Coeur d'Alene. This session is for campers of all ages and all Camp Cross experience levels.

## Cathedral Landscape Association Update

“Shortly after the completion of the first unit of the Cathedral in 1929, the Right Reverend and Mrs. Edward M. Cross saw a need for extensive landscaping of the grounds. The Cathedral was something more than an Episcopal Church building. They envisioned it as a community-oriented religious institution, thus bringing to it a note of ecumenism from the very start. They knew about a “Garden Guild” at the National Cathedral in Washington, D. C. and developed our Landscape Association along much the same lines. They invited approximately 50 women of the community, regardless of their religious affiliation, to form our Landscape Association. Our first large project involved the building of the rock retaining walls and the driveway at the front of the Cathedral. We have provided funds for capital outlays required for the properties, and in addition, have assisted with some

of the maintenance work.” *The Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist: A History of Its Women, Their Organizations—Their Work (As of this Golden Anniversary Year of 1979)*, in the Cathedral Archives

Since those first meetings in the fall of 1929, the Cathedral Landscape Association has continued to cast a vision for the care of the Cathedral grounds and to fund that care and engage the greater Spokane community. This includes everything from operating a USO café in the crypt during WWII to planting hundreds of bushes, trees, and flowers over the years, up until this very spring.

After careful discernment, the current members of the Landscape Association have concluded that after 93 years, it is time to transition much of their responsibilities to the Landscape and Grounds Committee, under the auspices of Chapter’s Property Committee. The Landscape

Association will continue to meet twice a year for luncheon programs and will serve as mentor to the Landscape and Grounds Committee as it maintains the beautiful grounds of the Cathedral to the glory of God and for the refreshment of the community.

We are gathering stories and pictures of the activities of the Landscape Association over these past 93 years. Was your grandmother or great aunt a founding member? Was your mother a member for many years? We will share stories and pictures in *The Chimes* over the course of the next year and will put together a display. You are invited to help celebrate the work and commitment of the Women of the Landscape Association at a recognition event this fall, during a worship service, with festive coffee hour to follow.

It seems fitting that the Outreach-sponsored effort to encourage writing cards and letters to legislators regarding the passage of sane and humane gun laws happened on Pentecost Sunday, when Bishop Rehberg, in her sermon, reminded us that the Holy Spirit came not only to comfort, but also to compel to action! We are grateful for the 140 mailings that were sent out from those who took time to share their thoughts and pleas with numerous national and local leaders of both political parties.

Our hope is that many among the St. Johns family will continue to advocate locally and nationally against the rampant violence and despair that pervade our country at this sad time.

Communication from concerned congregants included the following:

“Our children matter! It is a disgrace to have legal assault rifles and high-capacity magazines in our country. Protect our children, our liberty and future generations.”

“I write to you in heartbreak and anger about the availability and accessibility of weapons designed for efficient mass murder.”

“When the Constitution was written, all guns were single shot.”

“As a Christian and the father of school age children, I refuse to accept that this is their future.”

## Meet our Afghan neighbors

Our Afghan refugee family arrived during Holy Week. This includes Mom and her children ages 20, 19, 16, 15, 13, 10 and 2. The Dad did not arrive with his family but he is here now. Although we have been faced with a few challenges, the family is settling in well.

Mom and the children are being re-settled by Episcopal Migration Ministries (EMM) and Sponsor Circles. The Sponsor Circle Program is a community-led resettlement initiative that supports everyday Americans in taking on the responsibility of welcoming Afghan and Ukrainian newcomers to their communities. The congregations of St. Stephen's and St. John's formed the Spokane Welcomes Sponsor Circle.

The family has completed the medical refugee screening and have had their first new patient medical appointments. Appropriate medical referrals have been made. Three of the children have hearing impairment issues and have been referred for ENT evaluations.

Dentist appointments have been scheduled for the family.

All of the school age children are enrolled in school. The eldest is taking ESL classes at SCC and looking for employment. We are hoping that Mom will be starting ESL classes soon.

The Dad is being resettled by the International Relief Committee (IRC), Spokane branch. They will be helping him obtain the necessary documents for employment. IRC has helped the family find more permanent housing. We are also thankful for support from Mark Finney and Thrive International, a new refugee resettlement agency based in Spokane.

All in all, this has been challenging but also very rewarding. The family is now in a very different culture than they are familiar with and they are adapting slowly but surely. They are learning the bus system and working toward the goal of self-sufficiency.

Please keep them in your prayers as they continue with the difficult journey of resettlement.


