From the Dean By the Very Rev. Heather VanDeventer

Dear Cathedral Family,

The Feast of Pentecost is nearly here and with that we begin the season after Pentecost, also known as ordinary time or (as you have heard me say before) in Godly Play terms the great green growing season. This is a time when the rhythms of worship, formation, fellowship gatherings, and meetings shift into summer mode. While we may be a little more relaxed and not having as many entries on the calendar, God is still at work within each of us, within the Church, and within the world.

In mid-May, the Chapter had a working retreat, giving several hours on a beautiful Saturday to time together for a longer-range discussions that a typical monthly meeting allows. Across the morning, we reviewed, discussed, and offered further thoughts based on the work product from the table questions at the past two annual meetings. Many of you participated in those table conversations, considering ways that the Cathedral can reach in, out, and across (at the 2021 Annual Meeting) and wavs of welcome at the Cathedral and where our welcome needs improvement (from the 2022 Annual Meeting this past February). Chapter noted where the Cathedral has participated in efforts suggested in the reach in, out, and across ideas - this included supporting a refugee family, resuming a weekend evening worship service, reviving the greeters ministry, and intergenerational gatherings. We were excited about the number of children and youth in Sunday school and in worship, along with their parents and grandparents. We noted where, as a congregation as well as within specific ministries, we offer a warm welcome to tourists, visitors, and newcomers, as well as to long-timers and those we see at worship on a regular basis.

[In case you are curious, here's my definitions, based out of resources from the Alban Institute, for those three categories of worship attendees: Tourists are visitors from out of town or possibly from another church tradition who are coming to Sunday worship at the Cathedral in large part because of the Cathedral building itself. Visitors are those who may be seeking a new church home, looking at churches in places they plan to move or retire, and those who have family in the area and who come to worship once or twice a year. Newcomers are those seeking a new church home who have been to worship at the Cathedral three or more times over a six (or fewer) month period.]

Across the afternoon of the retreat, we turned our attention to discussing priorities for the 2023-24 program year. Chapter has more work to do to hone the list of priorities into a few which can be managed within a program year, so I am not sharing specifics but I do want to share the ten thousand foot level categories. Noting that the Outreach committee and ministry at the Cathedral has been a strong force for good in connecting with our mission partners and supporting them with funds, Chapter sees working on the broader issue of poverty as important. St. John's Cathedral is a cathedral for and with the city of Spokane and our broader region; we all see the effects of poverty in the community and believe we need to address it as Christians. Chapter also wants to continue to focus on ways of welcome and newcomer incorporation. And one last theme to share is appreciation of those who give of their time and talents at the Cathedral and in service to the broader community. Stay tuned for more details with the midsummer edition of the Chimes and as the fall of 2023 approaches.

I look forward to seeing you on Sundays and during the week this summer. How will you continue to grow with God during this part of the great green growing season? Be open for the ways that the Holy Spirit will lead you. In Christ's Peace, Dean Heather

Family, Children, & Youth Ministry News

Families with school-age children and youth are well into the dual sense of expectation for summer reprieve and a bit of dread for long hours of the day which suddenly lack structure. I invite you to consider whether it is also an opportunity to reflect on family spiritual practice. A change in season and schedule can sometimes create space for a new experiment or family conversation about how what you are already thinking of for the summer reflects your love of God and neighbor. Getting outside together can also be encountering creation. Watching a movie can be an opportunity to explore the intersection of story and God's story. Maybe a conversation could just be as simple as asking each other how you might be or plan to love God and neighbor as a family this summer.

We had a similar dinner conversation open to our larger St. John's family and youth ministry at the end of May. We have a lot to celebrate as the school year ends. Youth ministry, Sunday school, acolyte ministry, junior choir, and more! We had pizza, popsicles, and games for all ages. We also had some important planning to do as our regional youth minister, Elaine Patrick, has just left her position. We decided this summer is going to be about creating opportunities for gathering and community. We're planning two gatherings a month, hosted by youth and family ministry, but open to the whole congregation. One gathering will be at the Cathedral (think indoor board game night in the Great Hall or outdoor

evening s'mores and compline around a fire on the labyrinth) and one will be out and about town (think hikes or museums). Gatherings will be costaccessible to all.

Honoring Rosie Banta, Finance Secretary

Dear Cathedral Family,

It is with gratitude for thirty-three (33) years of work at and service to St. John's Cathedral that I write to let you know of the upcoming retirement of Rosie Banta as the Cathedral's financial secretary. Here is some of what Rosie wrote in her letter of resignation:

I answered a blind ad for a bookkeeper and it turned out to be for the Cathedral. I was hired by Canon Mart Craft and started working at the Cathedral on July 3, 1990. I feel fortunate to have been hired and grateful to have remained an employee. I have watched as three Bishops were installed and have worked for four Deans in addition to Interim Dean Mart Craft.

I have made many new friends over the years and will miss the day to day contact with them. When I started bringing my dog, Dobby, to work with me, he was a people magnet. Parishioners, old and young, would drop by just to see Dobby and I think he made more friends than I did...

When I started working at the Cathedral, everything financial was recorded by hand in ledgers. The Cathedral secretary had a word processor but that was it. And the "database" consisted of cards in file drawers. Now everything is done on the computer. Thanks to retired Dean Coombs and parishioner Dr. Jon Holloway, they convinced Dean Buenz that the Cathedral needed to move into the 20th century technologically. Dean Coombs persuaded Dean Buenz to allow me to go to Las Vegas for a computer convention one year and Jon Holloway donated one of his computers (which used DOS) and a dot matrix printer in the Finance office. Then we were off and running with some technology.

Wages were lean but benefits were numerous. My girls were in junior and senior high school when I started working at the Cathedral but I was able to take time off to go to all of their school functions, extra curricular activities, and any other important event in their lives. Today I have grandkids in high school, college, and in the workforce.

I have a new "to do" list of things for retirement. Surprisingly, not all of them are dog related and I am excited for this new chapter in my life. The Cathedral has been my second home. Fortunately I know where the Cathedral is and I know I can drop in any time.

Rosie has been the person on staff that I have turned to for the deep memory of the Cathedral, as she knows not only the ins and outs of the financials but also of the generation who have died. I am amazed at the longevity of her time on staff and humbled by her love for this place and its people. She has been our finance secretary, but also so much more. Parishioners and community members talk with her about their loved ones internments and coordinate with her the generosity that sometimes defines their lives. We will miss her humility, candor, reliability, empathy, responsiveness, and trust worthiness. The office will also miss visits with Rosie's dogs and her delight in our dogs as well.
